Hearing none, the agenda is adopted. 18 I would like to recognize Mr. Gordon Karg. 19 Is 20 that the correct pronunciation, sir? 21 MR. KARG: Yes, Chair. 22 CHAIR LUCE: Our new counsel for the 23 Environment, Assistant Attorney General. MR. KARG: Thank you, sir. 24 I would ask staff, Al Wright, to 25 CHAIR LUCE:

That would be Order No. 870 and Resolution 332, which has been reformatted without a word 3 being changed into a letter format, and those are the two 4 items on which the Council will be acting today. 5 6 And someone else just came on the phone. Are there any people in the audience that are participants in 15 this? 16 CHAIR LUCE: Yes, there are. Mr. Kahn is here 17 18 and others. So would the audience members please identify themselves for Councilmember Fryhling? 19 20 MR. KAHN: Gary Kahn, representing Friends of 21 the Columbia Gorge. 22 MR. BAKER: Nathan Baker, representing Friends 23 of the Columbia Gorge. MR. ANDERSON: Mark Anderson with the State 24 25 Department of Commerce.

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Page 8 1 PHIL COLLINS: Phil Collins, interested 2 citizen. CHAIR LUCE: All right, thank you. We 3 particularly appreciate interested citizens. 4 The phone keeps beeping, but we will assume we 5 6 can go forward at this point in time. Would you care to please summarize Order 870, 7 8 Al? MR. WRIGHT: Yes. You have in front of you a 9 completed, a completed order that the Council --10 11 (Noise on the speakerphone.) 12 CHAIR LUCE: I agree. Yes. 13 MR. WRIGHT: That's similar to the comments 14 we've gotten. 15 CHAIR LUCE: All right, Al. That was very 16 good, by the way. 17 MR. WRIGHT: We do have, well, still a draft, I guess, Council Order in its final form 870. It's been 18 reviewed, circulated and reviewed in draft form. We now 19 20 have it in final form for your consideration and vote. 21 It responds to -- as you know, we were required 22 by law to conduct a 20-day period after the Council voted 23 on October 6th to allow for petition for reconsideration. 24 That closed on October 27th. We received five petitions and an objection, 25

1 which we will deal with later today; and then we allowed 2 15 days, which closed on November the 14th, for responses to those petitions, and we had six responses. 3 Order 870 now is a compilation of the Council's 4 response to those petitions and the order resulting from 5 6 the Council's analysis of the petitions and the responses to petitions. 7 8 I don't know. Do you want to go through any detail at this point, or? 9 10 CHAIR LUCE: I don't think that that's 11 necessary. You might, if you wanted to highlight 12 something, there were two issues that particularly are addressed in here. 13 14 MR. WRIGHT: The issues of greatest concern and the amount of effort that the Council put into 15 16 responding, not that the effort on other issues was not as important, but the two that stand out of course, and 17 it's no surprise, one is the land use issue, which has 18 continued to be controversial throughout this process; 19 20 and, second, is the aesthetic and viewscape issues relating to the Council's, or the Council's order to 21 22 allow a certain amount of turbines within the boundary 23 area. Those are the two that received the most 24 The remaining of the issues, probably the 25 attention.

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1 third in order is the avian and wildlife issues. 2 Many of the issues -- there were very few things in both Order 868 and 869 that were not covered, 3 and there were many of the issues that were combined into 4 more generalized responses in this order, but those three 5 6 are the primary issues that the Council was responding 7 to. CHAIR LUCE: And I guess I would read the 8

10 The Council has considered all petitions for 11 reconsideration as required under RCW 34.05.470 and WAC 12 463-30-335. EFSEC finds and concludes that none of the petitions raises any factual or legal arguments that 13 14 EFSEC has not already heard during the adjudication and in post-hearing briefs, deliberated upon, and discussed 15 in Orders 868 and 869 and the draft Site Certification 16 17 Agreement. ADELSMAN: Yes. 23 CHAIR LUCE: Councilmembers, I would request --24 do you have any comments at this time? I guess I would 25 rephrase that.

Page 15 1 MR. FRYHLING: Dick Fryhling. I don't have any 2 comments. CHAIR LUCE: All right. Other councilmembers 3 have any comments? 4 5 MS. ADELSMAN: No. 6 CHAIR LUCE: May I take the silence as approval of the letter from the councilmembers' perspective? 7 MS. ADELSMAN: Yes. 8 9 MR. TAYER: This is Jeff Tayer. You may. 10 MR. HAYES: This is Andy Hayes. Yes. MR. MOSS: Yes. 11 12 CHAIR LUCE: All right. 13 MS. ADELSMAN: Yes for me. 14 CHAIR LUCE: And yes for the Chair. All right. I will assume that that letter will 15 16 be sent out this afternoon or shortly thereafter by our SEPA official, Mr. Wright. 17 18 MR. WRIGHT: Yes, sir. CHAIR LUCE: Are there any other matters to 19 20 come before the Council today? 21 MR. WRIGHT: There are no matters. I would 22 simply point out and remind the Council, since we won't 23 probably speak again until next year, that we presented you at the last meeting with the meeting dates for 2012. 24 I don't believe Kayce has heard anything back 25

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Page 16 1 from any of you. If you would take a look at those. Ιf 2 you have any conflicts or problems, let us know, because right after the first of the year we're going to submit 3 these as our official meeting dates for 2012. 4 MR. TAYER: Mr. Chair? 5 6 MS. ADELSMAN: I'm good with it. CHAIR LUCE: All right, "Mr. Chair," I heard 7 you first. 8 MR. TAYER: Yes. On the letter, the SEPA 9 letter, I wonder -- this must be pretty cryptic to most 10 11 of the people in the audience and on the phone. I wonder 12 if Al could just very quickly summarize what we're talking about. 13 14 MR. WRIGHT: Okay. Let me dig it back out. The letter is a joint letter from Friends and 15 16 SOSA requesting an either modification to or supplement -- excuse me, either a supplement to or a 17 revision of our final Environmental Impact Statement on 18 the Whistling Ridge Project, dated August 12, 2011. 19 20 The letter is dated November 11, 2011, and it asks for that consideration because of three pieces of 21 22 information that are cited: One is the U.S. Fish and 23 Wildlife Service revised recovery plan for the Northern Spotted Owl; two, the fact that the Council on 24 October 6th adopted an aesthetic and cultural heritage 25

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impact description in its order, which is -- which
changes the applicant's configuration of turbines; and,
three, the archaeological discovery that has been found
on Chemawa Hill; and because of those three
considerations, they're saying, they contend, that this
is new information and therefore requires to either
supplement or revise the Environmental Impact Statement.

8 We have responded to those three items. First, 9 the Northern Spotted Owl issue is something that is part 10 of our joint SEPA/NEPA process with the Bonneville Power 11 Administration.

12 The Bonneville Power Administration has been in 13 contact with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service. U.S. 14 Fish and Wildlife Service on December 9th wrote a letter 15 stating that their position has not changed relative to 16 the Section 7 consultation required under the Endangered 17 Species Act with the Bonneville Power Administration.

And hence, since that letter has not been modified, there basically is no new circumstance or conditions relative to this specific project. So there is no need to or requirement to supplement or revise the final EIS based on the Spotted Owl issue.

The second contention is that because the Council found under its aesthetic and cultural heritage impacts to change the proposed turbine configuration, that that is a change of conditions and therefore the
 Council should reopen the final EIS.

The response in the letter is that, while the Council did change the proposed turbine configuration within the application, that is a normal and accustomed process in the Council's proceedings.

7 The analysis the Council used to come to that 8 conclusion was exactly the same analysis that was used in 9 the final Environmental Impact Statement. There are no 10 new conditions, there are no new information, and there 11 is no new data used in that process.

While the Council may have come to different conclusions than the person who conducted the same process with the same data and the same technique in the EIS, there is basically no change in condition. So Council is finding that there is no, really, reason to reopen or supplement the EIS, because there are no changed conditions.

19 Lastly, the discovery of the archeological 20 object, which is a broken arrowhead on Chemawa Hill, is 21 somewhat the same consideration.

All parties have come to the agreement that the Chemawa Hill area is an important archeological area of consideration. The Council included a proposed protection plan in its draft SCA for the Governor to

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1 sign.

2	I think all parties have come to that
3	conclusion, that that's an area that needs to be of
4	archeological concern and protection. So therefore,
5	whether there was a broken arrowhead found on that site
6	or 150 broken arrowheads found on that site, it doesn't
7	change the conclusion and the information that is in the
8	final EIS and in the Council's order, that this is an
9	area of concern and needs protection.
10	Therefore, we found there wasn't any need to
11	supplement or revise the final EIS. So therefore, in
12	conclusion, the consideration is denied.
13	CHAIR LUCE: Thank you. Anything else from
14	councilmembers?
