Dear Mr. Posner:

As a grandmother, my overriding concern about the Tesoro Savage proposal to export up to 360,000 barrels of crude oil each day from the Port of Vancouver, WA. is the carbon dioxide (Co2) which will be added to the atmosphere when the oil is ultimately burned. Wherever that oil is burned, it will spew tons of Co2 into the air, a greenhouse gas that will remain in the atmosphere for centuries – some of it for millennia. Despite the warnings of climate scientists, carbon dioxide emissions are still rising. The current emissions trajectory is putting the world on a path to warm between 4 degrees and 6 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels by the end of this century. Prominent climate scientists, like Kevin Anderson, warn us that humans may not be able to adapt to that degree of warming. That means that we do not know if humans will survive in such a climate. We do know that our food and water sources will be severely restricted by increased drought, floods, ocean acidification, changes to the Asian monsoon, and increasingly severe storms.

In Washington, we are already impacted by the climate crisis – ocean acidification is threatening our shellfish industry and threatens the survival of salmon and the other fish on which our economy and much of the world depends. In the latest report from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, the world's leading climate scientists officially called for an <u>absolute upper limit on</u> <u>greenhouse gas emissions</u> to limit warming. To have a 66 percent chance of limiting warming to 2 degrees Celsius, beyond which scientists agree we will face catastrophic climate chaos, the world can't emit more than 800 to 1,000 gigatons of carbon, total. We have already emitted more than half of that amount. We cannot burn more than 10 percent of known fossil fuel reserves without pushing the climate over 2 degrees Celsius of warming.

I am requesting that in the EIS for the Tesoro Savage project you do a comprehensive study of the amount of Co2 which burning 360,000 barrels of oil a day will add each year to the greenhouse gases already in the atmosphere, and the cumulative amount of Co2 which will be added if that amount of oil is burned <u>each year</u> during the estimated life of the program. It is also important that you use peer-reviewed scientific literature to judge the effect that adding billions of tons of Co2 to the Co2 levels already in the atmosphere will have on the lives of Washington citizens.

I realize this is an enormous and difficult task. But we are faced with an unprecedented threat to the livability of our climate and the survival of civilization. We cannot add to that threat by burning more oil.

This letter is being written regarding the controversy over the unrefined oil transportation trains traveling through the State of Washington from Spokane to the Vancouver, WA proposed terminal.

I have two suggestions regarding this that may be acceptable to all parties: (1) Reduce train speed to 35 mph through the few towns along the route or (2) as a last resort, reduce the train speed entirely through Washington to 35mph or a speed agreeable to all parties.

In my younger years, age 8 through 22 I lived on a farm in the town of Irby in Lincoln County where we had steam engine and diesel powered trains on the Burlington Northern (Great Northern) run many trains a day within one-quarter mile of our house and we never had any accidents or fuel leakage problems that I can remember, so I don't think there is much chance of a major disaster with the unrefined oil trains.

Dear Sir:

I am a retired Railroad Conductor who worked in the Columbia Gorge for 35 years. This has allowed me to experience most all mishaps that occurred on a railroad.

The BNSF has well maintained the road-bed, they have safe operating crews and a good transport record. I believe that the speed for trains, that exceed 100 tons per operative brake, is 45 miles per hour.

This, however, gives rise to the question: How do you avoid the unexpected and unavoidable? Of course, you can't. You can only reduce the damage.

There are train-vehicle accidents, equipment failure, slides, washouts and rail sunkinks. Known slide areas are protected by slide fences and signal indicators. However, I have experienced passing a "proceed" signal then the slide occurs and the fence, on occasion, will not hold the slide. This is not the norm, but it does happen. Rail sun-kinks seem to occur randomly when the temperature exceeds 90 degrees.

Tank cars 111-111A, which were constructed prior to October 1, 2011, have no head shields, skins of 11mm thick and have a proven failure rate in accidents. The volatility of the fracking crude has been demonstrated in Quebec and Alabama during recent derailments.

A speed restriction of 30 miles per hour with a train consist having tank cares 111 and 111A constructed prior to October 1, 2011, can reduce the environmental effects in a derailment. Though these tank cars comply with DOT Regulations, it does not reduce their known failure rate.

There are no restrictions that prevent Tesora-Savage from upgrading the tank cars to October 1, 2011 standards, to protect our environment.

I offer the enclosed information as another view to the EFSEC Board for their deliberations.
