Greater Spokane Incorporated supports the Tesoro Savage Vancouver Energy Distribution Terminal. The proposed project will receive and ship North American crude oil to US refineries to offset or replace foreign imports and declining production in Alaska and California.

To prepare for the recent decline in crude oil in the Alaskan Northern Slope, it is critical to seek alternative domestic crude oil sources to alleviate dependence on foreign imports.
