MS. BUMPUS: Save the best for last.

So for the permit updates, the review of the application for the Notice of Construction Air Permit Approval was determined to be complete, and we are working to put together a letter to communicate that completeness determination to the applicant, and we'll be coordinating with our Department of Ecology air quality contractor to begin preparation of a draft NOC Air Permit, to keep you updated on -- as that as it develops.

For the Stormwater NPDS Industrial and Construction Permits, on February 27th of last month, the applicant submitted a revised engineering report, which we are now working to review, and we'll be coordinating the review of those materials with our ecology permit writers that are contracted with EFSEC. So again, we'll keep you updated on whether we need to request additional information to develop the permits.

For the HPA, we are still coordinating with DFW to reword some of the advisory provisions that were provided in the initial HPA, so we're going to continue doing that, and we're waiting to hear back from DFW on

MS. MARTINEZ: Thank you, Ms. Bumpus. Will you remind me, will the Council get to review a preliminary version of the EIS, the draft EIS, before it goes out to the public? Was that the approach? I can't recall.

MR. POSNER: I'll respond to that. Yes, that is the plan. And what we're trying to do now is, because as you all know, this document's going to be quite lengthy — we're expecting it to be several thousand pages long, including all the attachments and appendices.

Some of the chapters are actually coming to completion quicker than others, so we want to make those available to the Council sooner rather than later so that we can start getting some feedback and start addressing any issues or address concerns Council members may have.

So we're hoping this will speed up, actually; but as the document is developed, you'll see, you can look at sections, but you'll also have opportunity to look at the entire document.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: You anticipate some of those chapters, some of the early chapters, being submitted to Council members before the end of this month; is that correct?

MR. POSNER: That's correct.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: Yes. Ms. Martinez?

MS. MARTINEZ: And just one follow-up, if I

MS. BUMPUS: At last month's Council meeting, I mentioned some concerns for delay in the schedule for issuance of the draft Environmental Impact Statement. And since that update, EFSEC has received responses to all five data requests from the applicant, and we've been in close communication with the applicant and our consultants to review the responses and to perform work for the DEIS Impact Analysis.

Based on these considerations, Staff is estimating, at this time, there's a potential for a two-month shift in the overall schedule for the DEIS issuance. In light of this, we plan to provide sections of the DEIS to the Council for review, and we would provide those sections on the SharePoint site, which you'll be seeing a presentation on shortly.

Are there any questions on the status of the DEIS?

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: Ms. Martinez?

And then, do you have a target date for getting the draft EIS out to the public?

MR. POSNER: Well, as Ms. Bumpus alluded to, we're looking at approximately two months.

MS. MARTINEZ: Okay.

MR. POSNER: So, originally, we had talked about it May, so that would move us to probably July, is what we're expecting.

MS. MARTINEZ: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: Any other questions for Staff? Ms. Green-Taylor?

MS. GREEN-TAYLOR: Thank you, Chair.

So if the DEIS comes out in approximately July, does that impact our anticipated schedule for the adjudication hearings?

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: I will let Staff answer what they think is the approximate time for the — well, we have — the adjudication has been started in that we have — actually, I'll probably just let Ms. Noble speak a little bit rather than try to speak for her.

MS. NOBLE: All right. In my presentation about the status of the adjudication and when I asked the Council for direction on opening the adjudication, I stated that the issues really couldn't be formulated permanently

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or finally until the public was able to take a look at the draft EIS.

But we have started, and we have had Petitions for Intervention and we have had the Notices of Participation from various parties, and there are numerous procedural matters that we need to start addressing and get parties ready to proceed on to the adjudication.

So there'll be plenty to do between now and the time the adjudication starts. But it won't be started -- it can't be started with witnesses and hearings -- until all the parties and the public have had an opportunity to look at the draft EIS. I think that was the Council's intention.

MS. GREEN-TAYLOR: And how long of a period would you anticipate for that public review? Is there a time line in statute for that?

MS. NOBLE: Yes, there is, and we have to have meetings in, I think it would be, both Spokane and Vancouver, to allow --

MR. POSNER: And the SEPA requirements are -it's 30 days is the normal -- that's what SEPA requires for review.

MS. BUMPUS: Right.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: And we haven't had a chance as a Council to talk about where we would have those

outstanding.

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So when you would get that report, it would be good to not only read that report, but then the main body of that particular chapter would have to be tweaked some to encompass that additional report; so it's good to just kind of look at that underlying language for context as well.

MR. STEPHENSON: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: And I think we're going back to Ms. Bumpus at this time, unless someone has more questions for Ms. Noble.

MS. BUMPUS: That concludes my project update.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: And so do we have anything else regarding the Tesoro project?

MR. POSNER: Chair Lynch, Council members, I'd like to just kind of give you a quick update on the status of adjudication. Just in terms of last month, you were made aware that the order commencing agency adjudication was issued on January 28th.

Since last Feb- -- or February's Council meeting, we did receive eight separate Petitions for Intervention, six Notices of Party Participation, and the applicant filed a response to the Petitions for Intervention. And then there were five replies to the

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applicant's response to the petitions.

All of those documents are on our website, and they're also -- they've also been downloaded to the SharePoint site as well.

MS. NOBLE: Chair Lynch, I'd just like to add just one thing. One of those petitions had eight parties to it, so it was a joint petition. So I would just add that as far as the number of petitioners. Thank you.

MS. MASTRO: Good afternoon, Chair Lynch and Council members. Thank you for your patience. Kali and I have a demonstration on the SharePoint for you this afternoon.

Later this afternoon, I'll e-mail you a link to the Secure Access Washington, which is the page you're looking at on the screen now, as well as a link to the EFSEC Tesoro/Savage SharePoint site.

You have to set up a Secure Access Washington site account in order to access the State server from outside the State server in a local server, so a private e-mail, a local -- the local representatives would need to do so. If you need to access the SharePoint from your State computer at your desk, you can do so.

We're going to show you how to do this, Secure Access Washington, create account, because you'll need to do one for when we're remote down at hearings. We don't have to use it while you're at your State desk, you can use it while you're on the road.

It asks you for a verification code, and then it's going to send you an e-mail. So now you go to the e-mail that you created to sign in, and it sends you this e-mail which has a link to verify. So the easiest methods are: In the middle of the page is the link, so you click link

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: And we can't all use the same password of "123456."

> MS. WRASPIR: We can't use "password" either. CHAIRMAN LYNCH: Okay.

MS. MASTRO: You now have created a SAW account. This was what it should look like the first time you do it. Then you go to the Internet Explorer and hit the link that I send you in the e-mail this afternoon for the SharePoint site, which is the fourth tab over there.

And this is what the screen looks like when you first sign in. When you're at your desk at the State, on a State server -- will you do the drop-down menu. please? -- it was show Windows authentication or SAW authentication. The local representatives will need to use the SAW authentication, and the State representatives, if you're on a State server, will use Windows. Since we're on a State server here, we'll use Windows.

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suggest that you create a Gmail or other free e-mail account. You will need this e-mail for your Secure Access Washington, SAW, account.

The e-mail I send you this afternoon will have a link to the SAW website. From the home page, the link to create a new account is in the lower left side of the screen. Follow the instructions to create a new account, push start, and complete the fields and click the next button. We're going to call this, "EFSEC Washington,"

I went and created an EFSEC Gmail account so we could use it for this. Then create a user ID and password.

account, do you want us to create a new account using a new e-mail address?

MS. MASTRO: I would think that is -- I'm --

MR. POSNER: I don't know that that's necessary. I guess I would defer to our legal counsel and our ALJ.

MS. NOBLE: Thanks.

MR. POSNER: If there's a legal issue of why you would need to create a new account, I'm not aware of it, so.

Up at the top, the very top, the blue swirly design, from any page, will take you back to this page. The EFSEC Tesoro blue at the top is a link that will bring you back to this page.

So, our intent is to keep the center of the page with current documents. Since the draft EIS is the first opportunity that you have to use the site, you can go to — we've set up a page for you to do that with. So you go to the center of the page or the left link on either side, hit the "DEIS," and it opens up a page.

This is -- all the documents on this page are from a previous case. There are no Tesoro documents on this page, so when you open this -- when you get signed in and you look at it, it is just an example.

so what we're -- the intent is to comment and then the Staff will look at the comments, and then we'll go from there.

MR. MOSS: Not to get too much into the weeds on this today, but when I use PDF, I'm able to comment in the document itself. It brings up a little yellow balloon and I can just type right in there. It would seem to me that would be more efficient than doing this, not to mention that I can be looking at the text at the time I'm commenting on it rather than having --

MS. GREEN-TAYLOR: And you have to have Acrobat Pro in order to do that.

MR. MOSS: Then we should have Acrobat Pro.
MS. GREEN-TAYLOR: Yes. I agree with that.
MR. MOSS: I guess I must have that program
because I can do that. That's the only reason I mentioned
it. It seems pretty easy, straightforward.

MR. POSNER: So we -- that was one of the options that we looked at.

MR. MOSS: Oh, okay.

that manner was that, if I understand correctly, basically,
the document can only be checked out by one person at a

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The page is designed to give you access to the documents to be -- that will become the DEIS and comment on those documents. All these documents are from a previous case, and no Tesoro documents are on this page.

Staff recommends that when viewing the documents, you right-click the document you wish to review and right-click and open it in a new window. SharePoint doesn't support PDFs opening in a new window from the browser. You have to make that selection.

So, you review the document. At the point that you would like to make a comment on that chapter or section, you click on the "comment" link on the right side of that page, and it opens up a discussion board relevant to that section.

Staff is requesting and recommending that you enter your comments with the following descriptor: Chapter, section, subsection, page, and paragraph. We would like you to be as specific as possible so the Staff can identify the location you are describing in your comment. Type your comment, and then hit "reply."

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: And the reason we're doing that is because we want Council members to comment on the various chapters as opposed to editing them. Because just imagine ten people editing back and forth and -- you know, it would just not be very easy to pull all that together,

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looking at it and providing comments. So that was one area of concern.

And then the other area is that the document, considering we have ten Council members, it could become very modified -- I mean with multiple comments in the same area throughout the document. There may be some issues that, just in terms of, you know, how we respond and how we actually can distinguish between different commenters and address the comments.

However, I will say that this is sort of an iterative process. For those of you who have been on the EFSEC Council for a while -- and I think, Dennis, you're probably the only one -- you know, this is different than how we've done it on other projects.

So I think there's — from my perspective, there is flexibility to get feedback from all Council members and make changes if we feel that there would be a better way to do this, such as what you're suggesting as a possibility, but we would like to try it this way for this one or two chapters that we plan on having downloaded by the end of the month, and then we can see how that goes; and then perhaps we will make some changes, because there will be many other chapters for the Council members to take a look at.

MR. MOSS: Thank you.

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MS. MASTRO: SharePoint posts your comment with your name and sends an e-mail to Mr. Posner, myself, and Kali, just so we're aware of where the comments are.

In the center of the top of the page, if you go to "Council comments," this is a list of the discussion boards, so you can look for them also in this list, which shows up on the left menu, as well as on the center of the home page also.

We also set up a discussion board for "Review complete" so that you can go into that discussion board, put your name in that you've completed your review of a specific section or completed what is available to you, and that will send an e-mail to Mr. Posner.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: Excuse me. Do we have a question --

MS. MARTINEZ: I do.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: -- from the Council?

MS. MARTINEZ: Would you like us to include only one comment per reply box, or can we provide multiple comments on various sections of a chapter in one reply box? How do you want us to do that?

MS. MASTRO: We have discussion boards set up for each section, so it's a chapter and section. If it's a chapter that has multiple sections -- the example that I gave has 13 subsections, so I set up 13 discussion boards

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to drill it down a little bit. If you have, like, an overall comment about a chapter, you could certainly put it in there.

CHAIRMAN LYNCH: Mr. Stephenson?

MR. STEPHENSON: Thank you, Chair Lynch.

hearings, here's what a schedule of witnesses with prefiled testimony and exhibits might look like. Or not.

There would be links to these documents; and as they became available, then Staff will load them into the page like this. And again, I would suggest that you right-click on the link to open up the document so it opens in a new window.

We realize that the changes on the fly, so to speak -- so if a witness isn't available or they substitute a witness in, we can change that up as we go and make adjustments as needed. Any questions on this?

Back to the home page. I've set up a "help" or "request" link. If you click on the question marks -and this, I intend to leave right there so it's always right there on the home page -- it opens up into this form, which requires that you create a title. SharePoint, any time you see the asterisk, you have to fill in that field.

You can leave the disposition at "pending" and just let myself or Kali -- we'll be the two people checking this -- know what you need help with. Click "save," and then this is a list of the requests, which is also available from the home page on the left link.

And you can go to this page and see if somebody else had a similar problem and their answer's already there for you, or you can just call me or Kali.



Safety:

There were no recordable incidents this reporting period and the plant staff has achieved 4516 days without a
Lost Time Accident.

Environment:

- Waste water monitoring results are in compliance with the permit limits for the month of March 2015.
- A third party testing company was contracted by PacifiCorp to conduct Relative Accuracy Test Audits (RATAs) to verify that our continuous emission monitors are accurately measuring emissions. Testing was performed to determine concentrations and emission rates of oxygen (O2), nitrogen oxides (NOx), carbon monoxide (CO) and ammonia (NH3) from the exhaust stacks of two natural gas-fired combined-cycle combustion turbines (CT1 and CT2) and one auxiliary boiler. The RATAs were performed in accordance with 40 CFR Parts 60 and 75. The Relative Accuracy (RA) test results confirmed the monitors and emissions of the units are in compliance.
- PacifiCorp met with the Department of Ecology to propose a plan for additional groundwater monitoring
 wells related to the failed generator step-up transformer and oil spill that occurred in late 2013. John Rapp of
 ECY confirmed that our groundwater monitoring well installation and groundwater monitoring plan looks
 appropriate. The intent is to proceed with new well installation in April and begin the monitoring process
 quarterly. These actions are a apart of the plants involvement in Ecology's Voluntary Cleanup Program.

Personnel:

Authorized plant staffing level is currently 19 with 19 positions filled.

Operations and Maintenance Activities:

• The Plant operated specifically to conduct a RATA on the continuous emission monitors during the month of March. The year-to-date capacity factor is 7.90%.

Regulatory/Compliance:

- There were no air emissions deviations, waste-water or stormwater deviations or spills during the month of March 2015.
- An annual compliance evaluation and Title V inspection was conducted by staff members from EFSEC and the Southwest Clean Air Agency on March 18, 2015.
- Sound monitoring: There were no noise complaints to report.

I. Columbia Generating Station Operational Status

Columbia is operating at 100% power, generating 1085 megawatts. The plant has 664 days of continuous online operation.

Columbia is in the final planning stages for our refueling outage which will begin on May 9 and will concluded on June 15, 2015.

There are no other events, safety incidents, or regulatory issues to report.

II. WNP 1/4 Water Rights

Energy Northwest and The Department of Energy received the formal water right permit from the Department of Ecology in January 2015. The Department of Energy and Energy Northwest are starting the process to complete a NEPA review of the land lease and associated use of the water right. The preparation of the NEPA Environmental Assessment is expected to last through the summer of 2015 with formal reviews to follow.

Non Direct Cost Allocation for 4th Quarter FY 2015 April 1, 2015 – June 30, 2015

The EFSEC Cost Allocation Plan (Plan) was approved by the Energy Facility Site Evaluation Council in September 2004. The Plan directed review of the past quarter's percentage of EFSEC technical staff's average FTE's, charged to EFSEC projects. This information is used as the basis for determining the non-direct cost percentage charge, for each EFSEC project. In addition, the Plan allows for adjustment due to anticipated work load and the addition of new projects.

Based on the levels of work during the 3rd quarter of FY 2015, using the procedures for developing cost allocation, and allowance for new projects, the following percentages shall be used to allocate EFSEC's non direct costs for the 4th quarter of FY 2015:
