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6	CHAIR DREW: Good afternoon. This is
7	Kathleen chair Kathleen Drew, Chair of the Energy
8	Facility Site Evaluation Council. I am calling our
9	monthly meeting to order.
10	Ms. Mastro, will you call the roll?
11	MS. MASTRO: Department of Ecology?
12	MR. STEPHENSON: Cullen Stephenson, here.
13	MS. MASTRO: Department of Fish and
14	Wildlife?
15	MR. LIVINGSTON: Mike Livingston, on the
16	phone.
17	MS. MASTRO: Department of Natural
18	Resources?
19	MR. SIEMANN: Dan Siemann, here.
20	MS. MASTRO: Utilities and Transportation
21	Commission?
22	MS. BREWSTER: Stacey Brewster, here.
23	MS. MASTRO: Chair, there is a quorum for
24	the EFSEC Council.
25	CHAIR DREW: Thank you.
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1	Is there anyone else who has connected via
2	the Skype line who would like to introduce themselves at
3	this point?
4	MS. WARNER: Hi everyone. This is Kara
5	Warner with Golder Associates.
6	MS. DIAZ: This is Jennifer Diaz, Puget
7	Sound Energy Wild Horse Wind Facility.
8	MR. LICHTENBERG: And Scott Lichtenberg,
9	plant manager at Wild Horse Wind Facility.
10	CHAIR DREW: Thank you.
11	MS. RAMOS: Mary Ramos, Energy Northwest.
12	CHAIR DREW: Okay. Thank you all very much.
13	The proposed agenda is in front of you. Is there a
14	motion to approve the agenda?
15	MR. STEPHENSON: I will move to approve the
16	agenda.
17	MR. SIEMANN: I will move to second it.
18	CHAIR DREW: All those in favor, say "aye."
19	COUNCILMEMBERS: Aye.
20	CHAIR DREW: Opposed? Agenda is adopted.
21	The meeting minutes from May 21st are in
22	your packets. Is there a motion to approve the meeting
23	minutes from the May 21st meeting?
24	MR. STEPHENSON: I will move to approve the
25	minutes.

1	MS. BREWSTER: I'll move to second.
2	CHAIR DREW: Any comments or corrections?
3	All those in favor, please say "aye" of approving the
4	minutes.
5	COUNCILMEMBERS: Aye.
6	CHAIR DREW: Opposed? Minutes are approved.
7	Moving on to our reports from the projects.
8	The first is Kittitas Valley Wind Project.
9	MR. MELBARDIS: Good afternoon, Chair Drew,
10	EFSEC Council, and Staff. This is Eric Melbardis with
11	EDP Renewables for the Kittitas Valley Wind Power
12	Project. There was nothing nonroutine to report last
13	month. We do, however, this month have had fairly great
14	winds. Our capacity factor has been around 70 percent.
15	CHAIR DREW: Wow. Thank you.
16	Wild Horse Wind Facility?
17	MS. DIAZ: Yes, thank you, Chair Drew and
18	Councilmembers. For the record, this is Jennifer Diaz
19	with Puget Sound Energy at the Wild Horse Wind Facility.
20	I have a few updates for the month of May. We have
21	scheduled our next Technical Advisory Committee meeting
22	for Wednesday, July 24th.
23	And then Wild Horse reached 8 million
24	megawatt hours on May 24th. So that was a great
25	milestone for us.

1	CHAIR DREW: Yes.
2	MS. DIAZ: EFSEC Council Staff and Chair
3	Drew toured Wild Horse on May 22nd, and on May 21st, an
4	emergency response and rescue drill was conducted to
5	test our emergency response procedures and
6	communications with the local and regional emergency
7	responders. Puget Sound Energy, Vestas, Kittitas Valley
8	Fire & Rescue, Airlift Northwest Helicopter, LifeFlight
9	Helicopter, and KITTCOM, the emergency 911 dispatch, all
10	participated, and the drill was very successful and
11	lessons learned from that drill will be used to improve
12	our emergency response procedures.
13	Just a little more detail about the drill.
14	This was not a surprise drill. We have conducted those
15	in the past, but this one we wanted to involve
16	involve both the helicopter companies. So it was a
17	planned out drill, and it included a scenario with a
18	victim up tower with crushed legs, bleeding up in the
19	tower and excuse me, and and included trauma
20	heights and rope rescue training as well. So it was
21	very successful, and I believe in your packets were
22	included some photographs from that emergency response
23	drill.
24	CHAIR DREW: Yes, photographs as well as a
25	very informative positives and lessons learned. Really

1	appreciate having that information and that detail, so
2	thank you very much for that.
3	Are there any questions?
4	Thank you, no questions.
5	MS. DIAZ: Thank you.
6	CHAIR DREW: Chehalis Generation Facility?
7	Good afternoon.
8	MR. SMITH: Good afternoon, Chair Drew and
9	Council. My name is Jeremy Smith. I'm the
10	environmental analyst for Chehalis Power. We have no
11	abnormal issues to report for the month of May. Are
12	there any questions?
13	CHAIR DREW: Are there any questions? No.
14	We we look forward to planning our site
15	tour to your facility as well.
16	MR. SMITH: Yes, I believe we just confirmed
17	that, so thank you.
18	CHAIR DREW: Okay, great. Thank you.
19	Columbia Generating Station, Ms. Ramos?
20	MS. RAMOS: Good afternoon, Chair Drew and
21	Councilmembers as well as EFSEC Staff. This is Mary
22	Ramos reporting for Energy Northwest. I have two
23	updates for you regarding Columbia Generating Station.
24	First is Columbia Generating Station is near
25	the conclusion of its 24th refueling and maintenance

1	outage just in time to meet higher electricity demands
2	as summer temperatures rise. During the last several
3	weeks, Energy Northwest employees and approximately 1200
4	temporary workers completed thousands of individual
5	maintenance improvements and upgrades. The station
б	replaced 260 of 764 nuclear fleet fuel assemblies in
7	Columbia's reactor core as well as installed a
8	30-foot 34-foot 133-ton refurbished form pressure
9	turbine rotor. At this point, Columbia Generating
10	Station is in mount two, which is plant startup.
11	Today's activities include raising reactor power in
12	preparation to reconnect to the grid tomorrow.
13	And then my second update is regarding our
14	NPDES Permit submittal. On May 28, Energy Northwest
15	submitted as-built drawings for the Dehalogenation
16	Chemical Feed Project at Columbia. The drawings were
17	submitted to fulfill the plans and specifications
18	requirements of Washington Administrative Code. Are
19	there any questions?
20	CHAIR DREW: Thank you.
21	Are there any questions?
22	We also look forward to visiting your
23	facility this October. Thank you.
24	MS. RAMOS: Yes, thank you. We look forward
25	to that.

10	maintenance outage May 13th through 31st and didn't have
11	any environmental incidents or safety mishaps during
12	that outage period so consider it successful.
13	CHAIR DREW: Thank you.
14	MR. SHERIN: Any questions?
15	CHAIR DREW: Any questions?
16	Thank you again.
17	For the NPDES Permit, Ms. Kidder?
18	MS. KIDDER: Thank you. As you remember,
19	the Council voted to approve for public comment the
20	Grays Harbor National Pollutant Discharge Elimination
21	renewal permit. The public comment period was open from
22	April 22nd through May 21st. During this time, EFSEC
23	Staff received one comment, which was from the facility
24	indicating a clarification to the text that would align
25	the permit requirements with the equipment
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1	manufacturers' maintenance recommendations for a
2	continuous flow monitor.
3	An edit was made in coordination with our
4	Ecology permit contractor to permit condition S2.D.3 to
5	request that the equipment is calibrated annually. A
6	copy of the revised permit and fact sheet are included
7	in your Council packets, and a summary of this activity
8	can be reviewed in Appendix G of the fact sheet. Are
9	there any comments or any questions so far?
10	CHAIR DREW: Any comments or questions?
11	Okay. Thank you.
12	MS. KIDDER: Staff would like to request
13	that the Council take action to approve the Grays Harbor
14	Energy Center NPDES Permit as revised for public
15	comment, but should the Council approve the permit, it
16	would become effective July 1st, 2019.
17	CHAIR DREW: Okay.
18	MR. STEPHENSON: I will move that we approve
19	the Grays Harbor Energy Center National Pollutant
20	Discharge Elimination System Permit as amended.
21	MR. SIEMANN: I'll second that.
22	CHAIR DREW: Any comments?
23	Thank you for the good work for everybody
24	involved with that, also to the Department of Ecology,
25	our partners in reviewing the permit to the facility,
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1	Mr. Sherin, and our Staff.
2	All those in favor, signify by saying "aye"
3	to approve the permit.
4	COUNCILMEMBERS: Aye.
5	CHAIR DREW: All those opposed? Permit is
б	approved.
7	MS. KIDDER: Thank you.
8	In further news, I would just like to notify
9	the Council of some activity planned for the coming
10	months, which has been alluded to a little bit earlier
11	in the Council meeting. We tentatively planned for the
12	Chehalis Generation Facility to host a site tour for the
13	Council on the morning of August 20th prior to the
14	Council meeting that day, which will be held at our new
15	offices in Lacey. More details of this facility tour
16	will be made available to the Council as we coordinate
17	with the facility.
18	Additionally, we're also coordinating with
19	the Columbia Generating Station to host a facility tour
20	on Wednesday, October 16th. We would tentatively plan
21	for the October Council meeting the day prior, October
22	15th, to be held in Richland, at which time we are
23	hoping to have some presentation from the facility as
24	well as some of our contractors who coordinate with
25	EFSEC Staff with work related to operations and

1	emergency preparedness at the Columbia Generating
2	Station. Are there any questions?
3	CHAIR DREW: So please note those on our
4	your calendars for additional time and travel. For the
5	Chehalis site, I'd think we'd just start out here the
6	same as we did today for the Grays Harbor Energy Center
7	tour.
8	MS. KIDDER: That's correct. The Chehalis
9	facility is a short drive, and so we would likely meet
10	at the EFSEC offices that morning and carpool together.
11	The Columbia Generating Station is some distance away,
12	so additional travel arrangements will be coordinated in
13	the coming months.
14	CHAIR DREW: Thank you.
15	I would also like to let the Council members
16	know that, as you could see by the boxes and carts
17	around, we are moving next week. Actually this week, we
18	have to be clear of all our items and take our last walk
19	out the door on Thursday of this week before moving to
20	the new facility, which is located at 621 Woodland
21	Square Loop in Lacey. And our Council meeting next
22	month will be held in the hearing room of that facility,
23	which is room 110.
24	One of the really nice things about it is
25	that it's a nice facility, but you walk into the lobby
